# Fountain Hill Reversible Jacket

This reversible jacket was knitted with a dark sparkle on one side and a light solid on the other. Wear it on the solid side for casual wear during the day and on the sparkle side at night to add sparkle to that little black dress.



## Fountain Hill Reversible Jacket

MC= darker color  
CC = lighter color

Materials: 2 st holders

### NOTE:

1. Always bring both yarns to back to knit even though you will only use the one color for the st
2. And bring both yarns to the front to purl even though you will only use the one color for the st.
3. When starting a new row wrap color to be used around previous color as in fair isle
4. One side of your jacket will be dark, the other side a light color
5. K2tog - slp 1<sup>st</sup> st to right-hand needle, hold the P st to the back, move the slipped K st from the right needle back to the left needle and K them together, P2tog – put the loose P st back onto left needle and P2tog
6. Odd # rows K sts are light color
7. Even # rows K sts are dark color

With MC only CO 176 (184, 192, 192, 192, 192) sts

Before Starting Row 1 attach CC

Row 1 – \*With MC K1, with CC P1, repeat from \* across row

Row 2 – (K1, P1) 19 [20, 21, 22, 23, 24] times, \*M1K, M1P, K1, P1, PM, K1, P1, M1K, M1P, (K1, P1) 8 [8,8,6,4,2] times, M1K, M1P, K1, P1, PM, K1, P1, M1K, M1P\*, (K1, P1)26 [28,30,32,34,36] times, repeat from \* to \* one time, ssk, P2tog, K1, P1, TURN (you will not be at the end of the sts, this is a short row)

Row 3 – slipping first 3 markers as you go (K1, P1) to last marker, slip mkr, (K1, P1) twice, K2tog, P2tog, K1, P1 TURN

Row 4 – \*(K1, P1) to 2 sts before marker, M1K, M1P, K1, P1, slide marker, K1, P1, inc1 K, M1P, K1, P1, repeat from \* 3 more times, (K1, P1) to 2 sts before the gap, ssk, P2tog, K1, P1, TURN

Row 5 – (K1, P1) across past last marker to 2 sts before the gap, K2tog, P2tog, K1, P1, TURN

Rows 6-11 – Repeat rows 4 & 5 three more times. (You should have 24 [26, 28, 30, 32, 34] sts left unworked at each end of the needle.

Row 12 –\*(K1, P1) to 2 sts before marker, M1K, M1P, K1, P1, slide marker, K1, P1, M1K, inc1P, repeat from \* 3 more times, (K1, P1) to 2 sts before the gap, ssk, P2tog, (K1, P1) to end of row

Row 13 – (K1, P1) past last marker to 2 sts before the gap, K2tog, P2tog, (K1, P1) to end of row

Short row shaping is now complete. From now on you will work all the sts on the needle for each row

Row 14 – \*(K1, P1) to 2 sts before marker, M1K, M1P, K1, P1, slide marker, K1, P1, M1K, inc1P, repeat from \* 3 more times, (K1, P1) to end

Row 15 – (K1, P1) across

Repeat Rows 14 & 15 until you have 552, (592, 632, 664, 696, 728) sts on needle. You should have 78 (84, 90, 96, 102, 108) sts for both fronts, 120 (128, 136, 140, 144, 148) sts for

each sleeve and 156 (168, 180, 192, 204, 216) sts for back.

Work (K1, P1) across for 6 ( 6, 6, 4, 4, 4)rows

Dividing Row – (K1, P1) 39 [42, 45, 48, 51, 54] times to first marker, remove marker, place the next 120 [128, 136, 140, 144, 148] sts for sleeve on spare piece of yarn, remove marker, (holding both strands of yarn together cast on 9 [11, 11, 11, 13, 13] sts for underarm, (K1, P1) 78 [84, 90, 96, 102, 108] times for back, remove marker, place next 120 [128, 136, 140, 144, 148] sts of second sleeve on another spare piece of yarn, remove marker, (holding both strands of yarn together, cast on 9 [11, 11, 11, 13, 13] sts for underarm, (K1, P1) 39 [42, 45, 48, 51, 54] times. There should now be 348 [380, 404, 428, 460, 484] sts on needle for body (each CO counts as 2 sts)

Body :  
When you get to the CO sts on next round separate the two strands by knitting and purling into the appropriate color of each CO.

(K1, P1) across-Repeat until work from underarm measures 8 1/2". Work attached I-cord as follows: CO 3 sts of dark color, K2, K2 tog tbl, sl the sts from the right hand needle to the left hand needle, \*K2, K3tog tbl, repeat from \* across, K1, K3tog, tbl, BO last two sts.

## SLEEVES

Starting at center of underarm CO sts, taking care so light color does not show through to dark side , pick up 1K and 1P 5 [6, 6, 6, 7, 7] times, pick up 1K and 1P to close gap, K1, P1 across 120 [128, 136, 140, 144, 148] sleeve sts, pick up 1K and 1P 5 [6, 6, 6, 7, 7] times, pick up 1 more K and 1 more P to close gap, PM & join in round 142 [154, 162, 166, 174, 178] sts

### Next Round

(K1, P1) 4 [5, 5, 5, 6, 6] times, K2tog, P2tog, (K1, P1) around to 10 [12, 12, 12, 14, 14] sts from the end of the round  
(K1, P1) around for 20 [14, 8, 6, 6, 4] rounds

### Decrease Round

K1, P1, SSK, P2tog, (K1, P1 to last 4 sts, K2tog, P2tog

(K1, P1) around for 5 rounds

Repeat the last 6 rounds to desired sleeve length (approximately 20") Do not decrease to less than 98 [98, 98, 106, 106, 106] sts. Work attached I-cord as for body.

Repeat for other sleeve

### Neck I-Cord trim

With darker yarn and starting at front neck edge on the lighter colored side of garment, pick up and K 1 st in each stitch of straight section of fronts, 3 sts for every 4 sts across slanted sections, then work an applied I-cord across these sts.

Hide end in between the two layers.
